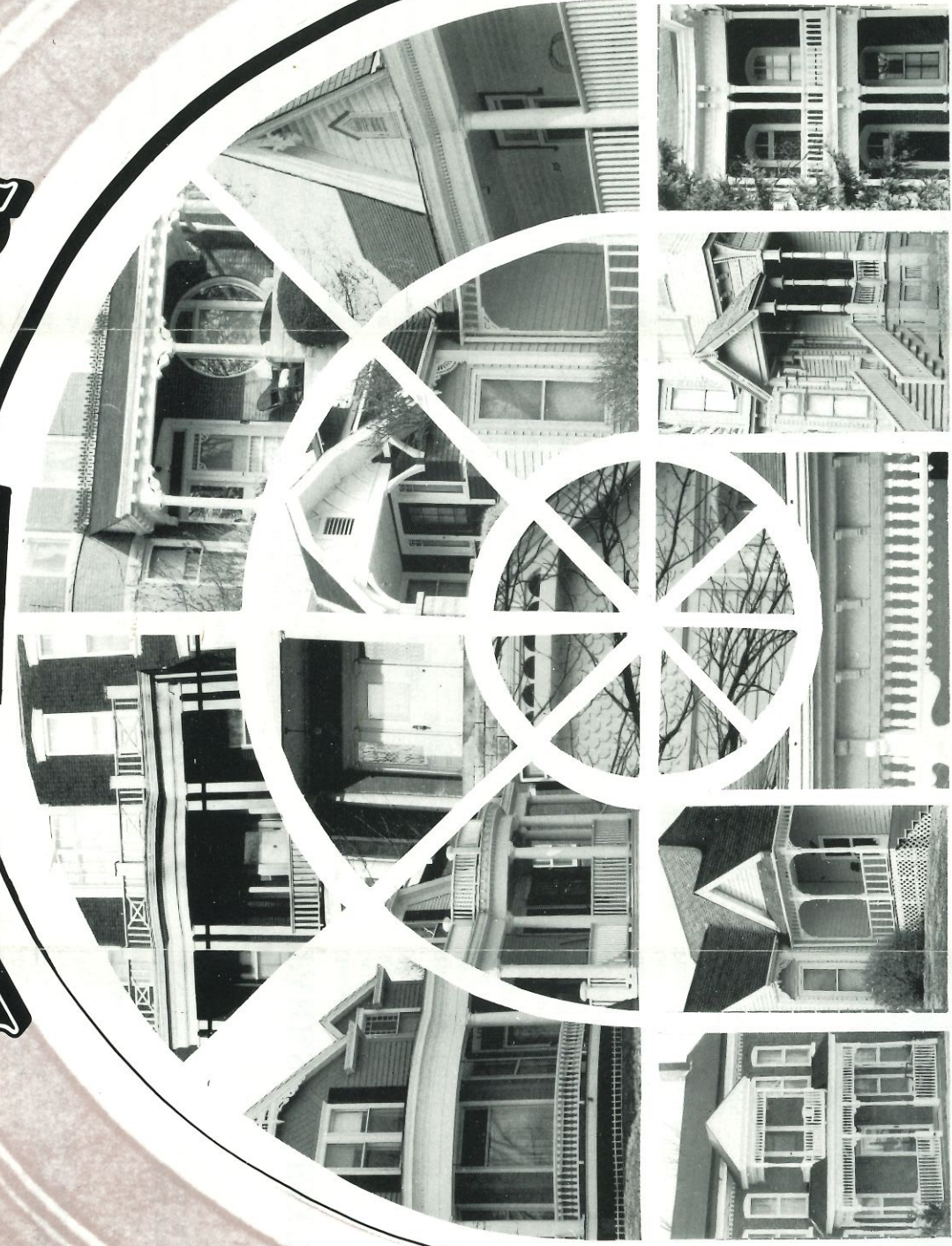
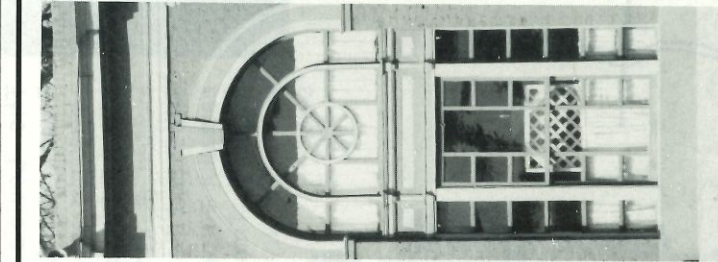
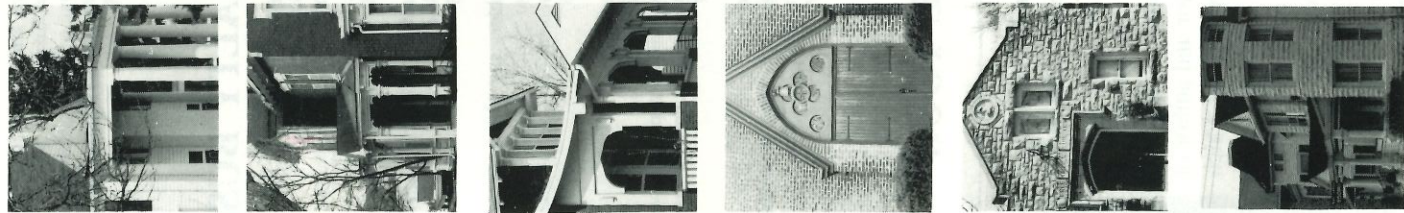


Louisiana



Situated on the river eighty miles north of St. Louis, with its riverfront and towering bluff parks overlooking the Mississippi, Louisiana has great architectural variety in its homes, churches and business buildings. There are exquisite examples of Greek and Gothic Revival, Italianate, Victorian Second Empire, Stick, Queen Anne, Romanesque and Folk Victorian dating back to 1818 when Louisiana was founded. Later examples of Colonial Revival, Mission, Prairie and Craftsman complete an architectural treasure that rivals any other river town. Surrounded by the rolling countryside of Pike County with its characteristic pastoral knolls, Louisiana certainly invites a country drive past many antebellum style plantations and estates.

LOUISIANA, MISSOURI

Louisiana, established in 1818 primarily by Southerners from Kentucky, Virginia, the Carolinas, and Tennessee who appropriated and recognized the beauty of the area and the fertile land reminiscent of their own, retains today an air of gracious friendliness and hospitality.

Many lovely antebellum-type and Victorian homes give testimony to a flourishing community. A five block downtown area has been designated as an intact historical district. Several houses are included on the National Historic Register. Tobacco industries and riverboat traffic, plus the construction of a railroad bridge in 1873, combined with the early establishment of Stark Bro's Nurseries and Orchards and a rich agricultural base, provided the impetus for a thriving, healthy early economy.

John B. Henderson, a Republican United States Senator, sponsor of the 13th Amendment abolishing slavery and who voted for the acquittal of President Andrew Johnson in addition to serving as a director of the two Louisiana banks, gave a parcel of land overlooking the Mississippi River known today as Henderson Park and enjoyed the year around. Champ Clark, distinguished Speaker of the House of Representatives who narrowly missed the Democratic nod as presidential candidate, opened a law office here, was head of the Louisiana schools and met his future wife, a teacher. Lloyd C. Stark, the Governor of Missouri (1937-1941) lived here, entertaining dignitaries from all over the world.

Truly a very special spot of Missouri, Louisiana boasts lush, rolling hills in the spring sprinkled with redbud, flowering crab, and dogwood, drawing hundreds of visitors to marvel at the spectacular autumn hill-sides, the Mississippi River magnificent and grand.

Louisiana retains the spirit of those early settlers, heritage proud, offering a visit of pleasant surprises whether it be antiquing, winter eagle watching, boating or accommodations at several outstanding Bed 'n Breakfast homes. We invite you to come see for yourself. You'll discover it all!
